County limits Yaphank housing

Suffolk officials have limited to 1,000 the number of units that two developers may include in their competing proposals for a large affordable-housing project in Yaphank.

But public officials and the developers, both of whom originally proposed more than 2,000 units, remain divided over how large the project should be, and over what impact the density limit will have.

"We obviously would like to see the opportunity for additional density to be further discussed," said Matthew Whalen, vice president of AvalonBay Communities. "With fewer units, there is less available money to put toward public benefits."

Avalon, a national developer

of rental complexes headquartered in Alexandria, Va., is partnering with Smithtown-based Damianos Realty Group in its proposal. The group's original proposal included 2,000 units.

But Kent Katter, chief executive of Katter Development Co. in Central Islip, called limiting the number of units "a good idea," and said the new request allowed for other savings to offset the lost density.

"In this case the county really did the respondents a favor by reducing the number of units and facilities to be relocated," Katter said. "Now we're able to put that money into public benefit facilities like the arena" the county has included in its plans for the site.

Katter's company, which partnered with Manhattan-based The Hudson Companies, had proposed 2,336 units.

Both developers said they were confident that they would

meet the county's new requirements in their final proposals, which are due next week.

The limit on density and request for additional information came in a letter last month from Suffolk planning commissioner Thomas Isles to the two development groups. County officials expect to select a bidder early next month.

Suffolk County Executive Steve Levy said the goal of the request was to "clarify" the county's intentions for the site, which it has kept largely undeveloped since obtaining it decades ago. He pointed to details about the arena, which will have at least 5,500 seats and will be built to accommodate minor league hockey.

The planning commissioner's letter also doubled the size of an industrial park to be built on the southern part of the property, south of Exit 67 on the Long Island Express-

way, from 40 acres to 80 acres; blocked the previously allowed relocation of county facilities; and stated explicitly that the county intends to sell the land.

The latter detail is crucial for Brookhaven officials, who have pointed out that the town board will have to authorize rezoning necessary for the project to proceed. If the county had retained the land and given developers a long-term lease, the town would have lost that control.

Brookhaven Councilwoman Connie Kepert, whose district includes the development site, said she thinks forcing the developers to meet county demands before they face town scrutiny puts them "in a difficult position."

"I have always said 1,000 units is too much for Yaphank, and I'll continue to say that," Kepert said.

Intelli-Check rebuts rumor of product ban

Intelli-Check Inc., the Woodbury-based developer of identity software, said it has been fighting "rumors" that a product by its Mobilisa subsidiary has been banned from use at Marine Corps, Air Force and Army bases.

Shares of Intelli-Check have declined since Monday.

Intelli-Check said in a filing with the Securities and Exchange Commission that it has

received "numerous shareholder inquiries" regarding "rumors" that its Mobilisa Defense ID system has been banned from the bases.

"We are unaware of any Marine Corps facility utilizing the Mobilisa product that has suspended its use," Intelli-Check said in a statement. Company officials did not respond for further comment.

Defense ID is a rugged handheld scanner that checks the authenticity of identification cards.

"The product has been certi-

fied at the base level and is now in the Marine Corps-wide testing and certification process," Intelli-Check said. The company said the Air Force has recently issued an "interim authority to operate," which it said allows base commanders to use the system.

In addition, Intelli-Check said, the Army recently issued a statement to "temporarily suspend" use of Defense ID while it moves from a base-by-base certification to a single service-wide certification. The compa-

ny said the move is to ensure that the computer systems are secure and data are handled appropriately.

Shares of Intelli-Check have fallen from \$3.40 Monday to \$3.28 yesterday.

In August, Intelli-Check merged with Mobilisa Inc. of Port Townsend in Washington state. Mobilisa became a wholly owned Intelli-Check subsidiary. The merger came soon after the death of Intelli-Check's chief executive, Frank Mandelbaum, who was 73.
